



In compliance with your request, the following represents a brief summary of my previous activities as Chairman of the Blood Bank Committee and our future activities.

As you may recall, this particular Committee was activated in 1964 and has since secured the continuing sponsorship of the Inter-Club Council with the result that we have had two annual drives with a total of 128 persons arriving to donate. Our own account has since tripled and we now have forty-three (43) pints to our credit.

We again plan to resume this activity thru the efforts of the Inter-Club Council and our next drive is presently scheduled for Friday, October 28, 1966, again at the Redwood City Women's Club, this time in the morning. As I am certain that you can appreciate, there is a tremendous amount of organizational work ahead of us as this necessitates each service group designating someone in their membership to coordinate this project and secure advance pledges from prospective donors. Incidentally, donations need not be limited to Club members but can also include spouses and other/family members. It will again be emphasized that each individual donating can specify that the blood be credited to his individual account, the Club to which he belongs or anyone else he wishes to so designate.

In conclusion, I have the following suggestions to make:

- 1) That the Secretary of our Club be instructed to write a letter of appreciation to former member Irving Lawrence who continues to voluntarily contribute blood to our account on a regular basis
- 2) That the Board of Directors go on record as requiring that all persons henceforth accepted for membership be obliged (unless physically disqualified) as a prerequisite to final acceptance, to donate at least one pint of blood to our Club's account
- 3) That the previous policy inaugurated by Past President James Fitzgerald be continued, namely, that those persons who contribute blood be publically acknowledged at the meeting and be exempt from fines for a designated period of time as a token of our acknowledgement of their contribution.

Chairman:

Your Job

To promote acquaintance and friendship among the members and do such work in pursuance of the general object of the club as may be assigned by the president or the board of directors.

From the beginning fellowship was the motivating force of Rotary. A fine way to "spark" fellowship in your club is to call attention to the fact that Rotary had its birth out of a desire on the part of Paul Harris for the companionship of other men. Out of that fellowship came the Ideal of Service. The ideal situation would be one in which all fellowship came from *within* each member. But, since there is a necessity for some guidance in this phase of club activity, let your committee function in such a manner that no one realizes there is a special committee to promote friendly contacts within the club. This leaflet contains many suggestions which will help you promote acquaintance and friendship in your club; adapt them to your needs.

Getting Under Way

First, study the suggestions in this folder. Then, call a meeting of your committee at the earliest opportunity to make your plans for the coming year. You will want to find the answers to these two questions: (1) What can we do? and (2) Which committee members will be responsible for certain activities? As you get down to work on your plans, you will want to consider the following points:

Greeting Guests

1. Welcome visiting Rotarians immediately upon their arrival. Make them acquainted with one of your members of similar interests so they may sit together and enjoy each other's company.

Some clubs provide a special visitor's badge; others present a copy of the current issue of the club bulletin along with a folder on points of local interest.

2. Report visitors' names, classifications and clubs together with any other interesting information about them to the club president so that he may be able to introduce them properly.

3. Sometimes visitors are accompanied by their wives or members of their family. Remember to arrange for their comfort while the Rotarian attends your meeting.

4. Plan follow-up on guests. The president of one large Rotary club sends a letter of appreciation to each visiting Rotarian following the latter's visit to the club.
5. Be especially hospitable to non-Rotarian guests. Keep a supply of "Brief Facts About Rotary" (pamphlet 1) always on hand and present a copy to non-Rotarian guests.
6. Have committee members on hand to greet and register all guests. Provide guests with information regarding your city. Be courteous and friendly! Let your guests depart with kindly thoughts of your club and community.

7. Pay special attention to guest speakers.

(a) Co-operate with the program committee in welcoming the guest speaker, and in making him feel at home.

(b) Urge your members to remain seated until the program is finished and the speaker has been thanked. Discourage them from leaving before the program is completed.

(c) Ask your members to express personally their appreciation to the speaker.

(d) See that a letter of thanks is written to the speaker. With this letter should go a copy of the club bulletin which comments on the program, as well as a copy of the local newspaper which carries the story of the meeting.

(e) Some clubs send a subscription for THE ROTARIAN magazine to all non-Rotarian speakers.

6. Introduction of Members:

(a) Every week the president appoints a different member as the official "Get-to-know-members" announcer. He selects and introduces two other members and tells something about them.

(b) You might call on one member at each meeting to introduce the 10 men sitting on his right by first name and classification; or,

(c) Call on a member to introduce all the "Jims," "Joes," "Johns," etc., in the club.

7. Friend "X": At the first of the Rotary year the fellowship committee sends a form letter to each member which reads as follows: "For the coming year you are to be FRIEND X to Rotarian _____ . During this year, without letting your identity be known to him, you are to take a special interest in him and his family—remembering his birthday with a card, writing him a note if he is sick, congratulating him upon accomplishments by him or his family—generally being a special friend to him. But he must not know who you are. Anything sent to him must be signed only 'Rotary Friend X.' At the end of the year, the identity of each Friend X will be made known." Following this explanation is some pertinent information about the Rotarian to be remembered, such as his birthday, home and business addresses, phone numbers, wedding anniversary, etc.

8. Remembrances:

(a) Many clubs have a special subcommittee to supervise this activity. Flowers, personal calls, and letters are usually in order.

(b) When children are born to the wives or daughters of the members of your club it is a nice gesture to send flowers or greetings.

(c) Many clubs present resolutions as befits the occasion, on the death of a club member.

9. Ladies' Night: Write to the secretariat of Rotary International for "Ladies' Night Program Suggestions," (No. 426). It is free on request. Also in this paper will be found suggestions for the night that the ladies are invited to take over the club meeting.

10. Picnic: In some month, when attendance may lag because of the heat, put on a picnic or outing at a country club, or at a private lodge or camp with the members and the ladies furnishing their own food, but served by someone hired for that purpose, so that all the guests may enjoy the dinner.

11. Seasonal Sports: A large number of clubs sponsor softball, bowling, golf, curling tournaments—in some cases the ladies of Rotary participating.

12. Theatre Party: It is the custom of some clubs to hold an annual theatre party for the members and their families.

Contacts With Other Clubs

Intercity Meetings: Plan intercity meetings with clubs in your own district. This should be done through the co-operation of the District Governor. Many fellowship stunts can be arranged for these occasions.

A novel idea for promoting interclub fellowship was worked out by a group of five clubs in one district. The plan involved a schedule of interclub meetings in which each club visited every other club in the group during a period of ten weeks.

Courtesy Day: One of the large clubs has developed a plan whereby, once a month, a certain meeting day is set aside as "Courtesy Day" for one particular club in the vicinity—a special table being reserved for the members of that club who are invited several weeks in advance to make this visit.

Exchange Programs: Two Rotary clubs with the same name but located in different states (in U.S.A.) put on a fellowship exchange meeting by proxy. The three discussion topics agreed upon—"The History of Our Town," "A Bird's Eye View of Our Town," and "Our Rotary Club," were prepared in written form by each club and sent to the other along with a written greeting from the "visiting president" and introductions of the "visiting speakers." On the day of the meeting these presentations were read to each club as though they were being presented by the members of the other club. Similar exchange programs by proxy have been developed between clubs of the same name located in different countries, as an international fellowship activity.

Individual Visits: A number of Rotary clubs have intercity committees which function differently. The duty of one of these committees is to promote visits to other clubs, especially on charter nights, club anniversaries, and other special occasions. The intercity committee of another club visits all of the clubs in the district at least once during the Rotary year.

Each week one club entertains one of the club presidents in the district.

Club Programs

Honoring the "Old Timers": So that all the club members may revive their memories as to who the club's past presidents are, occasionally you may wish to have them seated at the speaker's table and introduced as the club's former leaders. On your club's anniversary, or other special occasion, invite the past presidents to put on the club program.

To renew the fellowship between present and former club members, and, perhaps, to create a desire in the minds of eligible former members to return to the club, you might wish to conduct an "Old Timers" meeting, inviting all whose addresses are known—in and out of town. Introduction of the guests, giving former classification, what they are now doing, etc., comments by these former members on what Rotary meant to them, would be appropriate features of the program.

One Rotary club holds an annual banquet for its charter members. The 5th, 10th, 15th, 20th, etc., anniversary of the club would be an excellent time to give special attention to your club's charter members.

Three-Minute Biographies: A man's own life is one subject he is certain to know more about than any other club member. A three-minute biography might be planned for each meeting until all members have appeared on the program continuing with the new members as they come into the club. Or, after five or six new members have been taken into the club, they might be asked to put on an entire program, each one giving an account of his own life.

"Clubs I Have Visited": Invite a club member to report on his visits to Rotary clubs; pointing out, (1) favorable impressions; (2) how he was greeted and made acquainted; (3) type of programs; (4) unusual customs or practices as compared to local practices; (5) observed procedures that might be beneficial to the home club—particularly where fellowship activities are concerned; (6) physical surroundings, meeting place, luncheon, how served, etc.

What's New? Allot two minutes at each meeting for a member to tell of some of the new developments in his field of business or professional activity. At first it may be necessary to assign these talks, but later try to get the members to volunteer so that each will have an opportunity to tell his story while it is still new.

One-Minute Men: The following topics have been used for interesting one-minute talks by club members: "When I Broke the Law," "I Remember When," "How I Got Gypped," "The Best Joke I Ever Heard." The problem is to hold the speakers to one minute.

Hobby Day: Have several members describe their favorite hobby, avocation, or other outside interest. From time to time continue this until all members have had an opportunity to participate.

It will contribute some fascinating reading material and show an important segment of the business life of Redwood City.

The second suggestion could be to have the budget committee set aside a sum of money to hire a regular editorial person who has experienced in preparing such material. Dr. Alan Boswick has volunteered to act as consultant with the chairman in this prepublication work. He has pointed out that the book deserves to be prepared in a professional manner.

The last suggestion, the Rotary Club should allow at least \$500 for the publication of this history. At some near future date, the history book could be sold to members of Rotary and the Community at large for \$2 and \$3 to help recover some of the expenses.

SUBJECT: INTER-CLUB COUNCIL REPORT 1966-1967.


The following is a summary of the objectives of the Inter-Club Council Committee for the 1966-1967 fiscal year:

(1) The annual blood bank drive. At the regular monthly meeting held August 22, 1966, the members of the Inter-Club Council were advised as to the details concerning the blood bank drive and were requested to furnish the names of the chairmen for each club, and the names of the members who would be willing to donate blood from these clubs, at the next regular meeting of the council to be held September 26, 1966. It is hoped that with the cooperation of the Inter-Club Council the annual blood bank drive will be a success (the actual day of the drive is October 6, 1966).

(2) The Redwood City Centennial. It was proposed that the Centennial Celebration be held (commemorating the 100 year anniversary of the incorporation of Redwood City) during a period commencing May 25, 1967 and ending in March, 1968. The details are not yet firm but participation by the various member clubs could or would include monuments at historical sites, historical trail markers, rendering of personal services, and participation in the various events which might be planned by the Centennial Committee.

(3) During the year there will undoubtedly be activities which arise from time to time which can most expeditiously be performed on an Inter Club basis with the assistance of the various clubs. However, the above mentioned activities are the only specific ones mentioned to date with which I am familiar.




The Program Committee has held its first meeting at which Program Chairmen for each month have been designated, and a great deal of time was spent discussing the types of programs which have been most popular.



Subject: Committee Plans for 1966-67

The principal objective of a program of Rotary Information is to PUT ROTARY IN THE MAN. Plans have been made for the thorough indoctrination of each new member. Plans have also been made for an intensive program of Rotary Information for every member of the club during the year -- for it must be a never-ending effort.

Program For New Members

1. After the prospective member has been cleared by the classification committee, the membership committee, and the board of directors, he will be invited to meet with his proposer, the club president, and several members of the Rotary Information Committee, for the following purposes:

- a. Discuss the history of Rotary, and specifically the history and activities of the Rotary Club of Redwood City
- b. Discuss the object of Rotary
- c. Discuss the privileges and responsibilities of membership
- d. Discuss the cost of participating as a member
- e. Size up the man personally

This preliminary meeting is held just prior to the time that his name is cleared to be circularized throughout the club. The man must know and understand quite a bit about Rotary before the club has a right to ask him if he will permit his name to be circularized. The man has every right to ask searching questions about Rotary at this meeting.

2. Dignified induction ceremony. A dignified and significant induction ceremony will be carefully planned and carried out for the official presentation of the new member to the club. The new member must be given status in the eyes of the members.

3. Follow-up Indoctrination Meeting. A follow-up meeting (preferably evening with the Ladies present) will be held when there are two or three new members. The purpose is to explore more fully the program of Rotary, and to provide information for the Ladies of the new members.

4. Assignment to an active committee. The new member will be assigned to an active committee by the president immediately after becoming a member. The committee chairman has the responsibility of calling a committee meeting as soon as practicable in order that the new member may meet the other committee members, learn of the plans and activities of the committee, and become familiar with his own responsibilities.

5. Meeting with Board of Directors. The board of directors has been urged to invite the new member to a meeting within the first four months in order that he may learn and appreciate the inner workings of the club.

6. Visit another club. Arrangements will be made for each member to attend a regular meeting of a Rotary club in a neighboring community within 60 days in order that he might become familiar with the procedures involved in getting attendance credit, introducing himself at the meeting, and experiencing the rich fellowship that comes through visits to other clubs.

7. Meeting with classification committee. The classification committee has a great responsibility toward new members. The classification committee has been urged to invite each new member to attend a committee meeting within the first four months after membership, for a clear understanding of classification is most important in building a deep appreciation of Rotary. In fact, it is the very foundation of Rotary.

8. Give biographical sketch to club. Each new member will have the opportunity to have the spotlight at a regular meeting sometime during the first six months, at which time he is asked to present a brief history of his life -- highlighting his business or profession, his family, his special interest and hobbies, and other items of interest. The club must give this kind of training to every man in order that he will feel comfortable when called upon to appear before groups. This is an important part of our Club's in-service training responsibilities.

9. Sit at head table. New members will be seated at the head table frequently enough in order that they may be introduced to the entire membership and become known more rapidly.

10. Serve as chairman of the day. The program chairman will be encouraged to invite each new member to serve as chairman of the day sometime during his first year of Rotary membership -- to introduce and present the speaker, aid in the planning of the program, and the follow-up after the meeting.

11. Attend fireside meetings. The Rotary Information Committee will plan a series of fireside meetings, for the entire membership. A special effort will be made to have all new members in attendance.

12. Visit new members. The total membership of the club will be encouraged to visit the new member at his own place of business soon after he becomes a member.

13. Visits to Ladies of Rotary. Arrangements will be made for several ladies of Rotary to call upon the Lady of the new member, make her acquaintance, and see that she gets a personal invitation to the special activities in which the Ladies participate.

14. Encourage District Conference attendance. District conference attendance is important as soon as possible in one's Rotary life, for there is a kind of fellowship provided on the district level that cannot be duplicated on the club level.

15. Rotary literature for new members. Rotary literature will be given to each new member at the time of induction. Plans will be made to provide other materials periodically throughout the year.

If the above procedures are carried out meticulously, each new member will feel that he is a part of the club, will realize that he has a contribution that he can make to the club, and will be well informed as to the duties and responsibilities and privileges of membership. In other words, he will be a WELL-INFORMED ROTARIAN!

Program For All Members

A variety of techniques must be employed and a number of media must be used in order to reach the entire membership of any club with a well-rounded program of Rotary Information.

1. Fireside Meetings. These have high priority in our planning for the reason that, when properly planned, they can involve the majority of the membership. Our plan is to schedule a series of meetings during the week in which February 23 falls, which is the anniversary date of the founding of Rotary. Meetings will be planned for Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings in the homes of members. Each member will be invited and urged to sign up for a particular evening meeting. Hopefully 6-8 meetings can be held. Special leadership teams will be set up, and planning meetings will be held to set up the agenda or format for handling the discussions. The goal is 100% participation during the week.

2. Club Bulletin. A part of the bulletin every other week should be set aside for a real Rotary message. The Rotary Information committee is assuming this responsibility.

3. Rotarian Magazine. This is one of the greatest Rotary tools available to every Rotarian, yet it is too often overlooked. Our committee will work with the Magazine Committee in making greater use of this important international tool.

4. Written Information Releases to Total Membership. The committee plans approximately four written releases on Key Rotary topics to be distributed during the year to the total membership.

- a. Classification
- b. Attendance
- c. Highlights of Redwood City Rotary
- d. Brief history of Rotary

5. Buzz Session on Classification. With the cooperation of the Classification Committee, we plan to arrange for a regular program highlighting the principle of the classification through a "buzz session." In this way, every member in attendance will become involved in an intimate discussion of classification.

6. Encourage Visitations and Inter-city Meetings. These provide a wealth of Rotary information to members.

7. Encourage District Conference Attendance. Attendance at the annual District Conference is a fundamental part of any program of Rotary information. The Rotary Information committee will cooperate with other committees in pushing member participation.

8. Identify Weekly Programs With Rotary Service. Each Rotary program should be identified with one of the avenues of service. The four avenues of service should be represented in the scheduling of the club's programs in order that balance may be given to the entire program of Rotary. In order to keep the membership informed as to the fundamentals of Rotary, specific programs on Rotary history, classification and membership, and other topics must be presented periodically.

Over the years Rotary has perhaps suffered more from the lack of Rotary Information than from any other one thing. The above program is an ambitious one. We sincerely hope to make some progress, and to build on the fine work carried on by previous committees.

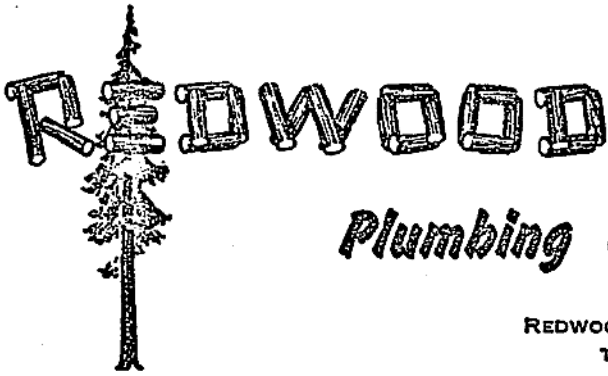

Our Committee would like to submit the following ideas for your approval for 1966-1967:

- (1) That we have a Speaker, from one of the Trades which have Apprenticeship Programs, speak at one of our Luncheons and explain just what is required of today's Youth to enable them to enter Apprenticeship.
We feel this would be of great benefit to the Members in helping with part two of our Recommendation.
- (2) That we work with a group of twenty to thirty young people (Tenth Graders), and give counseling and guidance to them through the summer with reference to Industry's educational requirements and career opportunities. This group would consist of both girls and boys; primarily from our Negro Population. The group must be kept small if we are to give adequate counseling to the individual.
It is our intent, that we arrange for the youngster to observe Business and Industry in action, on the scene in offices with personnel working at their vocations. This would cover all vocations and should not be regulated to any one segment of Industry.



It appears that the basic problem at Woodside High is that their faculty is liberally sprinkled with kiwanians; and they already have an active "Key" Club. Until we get some ROTARIANS on their staff our chances of Interact at Woodside are pretty slim. At any rate, a dynamic Interact Club at Sequoia may be the inspiration needed.


There seems to be some improvement in readiness for Interact at Sequoia High School, and we believe the following steps are in order.

1. Bob Biggs has consented to approach faculty members who he feels may be suitable and available to act as an Interact faculty advisor. We do not feel it's wise to start Interact without an advisor available and skillful in drawing out the best in its members.
2. Bob, along with the entire committee, will look for projects with which a potential Interact Club can initiate a dedicated program. Whether they use our projects or one of their own is immaterial, but from the start, the club must have reason and aim; our Club pride in sponsorship is not enough.
3. Along with the established practice of hosting a senior student guest each week, we believe it worthwhile for the Rotary Club to invite potential Interact sophomore and junior students to our meetings so that they might become acquainted with what Rotary is, and develop some affinity for its aims. From this group of students, we believe an interested nucleus for Interact can be established within the student body.

Committee Advisor George (Chaffey) proffered the suggestion that, to reduce the chances for what may otherwise become an "Interact Fraternity", the Interact membership be established on a classification basis, with a limited number of distinctive boys be allowed from each of the various departments (history, math, languages, etc.) and activities (sports teams, newspaper, art, drama, debating, etc.) in the school, to establish a broad base of service -- in much the same manner as Rotary membership.

It's with the above in mind that our Interact Committee starts its new year. Wish us well, and the backing we're likely to need (note particularly the item re sophomore and junior guests), and, though we do not guarantee complete success, we'll do our best to have an active Interact Club going strong before your impeachment.


RE: GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE COMMITTEE

In 1964-65 our Club also endorsed this program when asked to do so by Governor Stan McCaffery. Under Rotary Foundation rules, we pledged whatever support needed and as a result, our Group will soon complete the first visit of its kind in Japan. The Program Committee will be requested to feature one or more of our District 513 Group upon their return.

The Exchange Group of Japanese are now expected to be in our District for eight weeks some time next Spring. Our Club will cooperate and coordinate with all other District Clubs in our opportunity to host these visitors in our community during their stay. This means placement in our Rotarian homes from four to seven days and includes day-to-day plant visits, sight-seeing, social and cultural activities, etc.

Governor Stan Lance's year will feature broad emphasis on the International avenue of service and our G.S.E. will be featured strongly. The District will also have an opportunity next year to send a second Exchange Group to Australia and it will, therefore, be necessary for us to consider nomination of eligible young men for this visit.

In order to adequately service this Committee's activities, will you kindly consider budgeting \$100.00?


Dear John:

As chairman of the International Contacts Committee, I propose that the following chores and goals be attempted by this committee during the next year.

1. To institute a gift exchange with foreign clubs in which we might write to a foreign club requesting that they send us a gift of approximate value of \$5.00 or less and we would repay them either in cash or in a return of a comparable gift.
2. To help with the Redwood Seed Program to the following extent:
 - a. To address initial thank you letters to the foreign clubs for seeds that are being currently received, trying to use commemorative issues of stamps for the benefit of those in foreign clubs who might be interested in collecting stamps.
 - b. Pursue contacts already made with foreign clubs to keep them alive.

Dear John:

As the outgoing Chairman of the International Medical Projects Committee I am submitting the following report. I will also act for Wally Miners until his return from his European trip in five to six weeks.

During the past year the samples which were collected for disbursement through the Direct Relief Foundation, Inc., have risen to about 180 boxes. These will be shipped in the next few days. It would seem to me that there is adequate need for this project to be continued.

No assistance was given to Project Hope during the past year. Wally Miners noted that two years ago the Hope was off Peru near Trujillo. The Rotary Club of Trujillo has sponsored a permanent clinic following the visit of the ship Hope. Wally feels that next year the Club may inquire of the Rotary Club of Trujillo, as to whether they need some type of assistance which would come under the province of the International Medical Projects Committee.

The Committee received several letters from Edmundo Garron and others from the hospital in Cochabamba in Bolivia. It took some time to clarify for these people the fact that we did not have drugs available that could be shipped to them directly. We still have several doctors who travel and it would be helpful if they would identify themselves as doctors in their travels in order to promote good will in this area. Also members of the Club who know that doctors from foreign countries are going to be visiting in the area could let the members of the Committee know, and efforts could be made to show them the medical facilities in the area.

As usual with all Rotary Committees, it appears that a small amount of work is left to be done by the incoming committee!
