Goals of the District Awards Committee for 1983-84

- Governor's Award: The club will have at least one member who sponsors three new members.
- Attendance Award: The club will improve its 7th place position of 1982-83.
- Dist. Conf. Award: The club will improve on its past percentages of attendance and hopes to be in contention for at least one of the three awards.
- Membership Incr.: The club will increase its membership by a minimum of 6.
- Community Service:
(Chas. Wheeler) The club is making an effort to locate community service projects which will require member participation. The major fund raiser, an auction, will be held again this year; last year's auction raised over \$8000 for community and international projects and for scholarships.
- Rotary Foundation:
(Wally Myers) We are well along toward the best year ever, with eight new Paul Harris Fellows so far this year. A definite goal is to increase the number of sustaining members.
- Best Club Award: Hopefully we'll have a chance to qualify for this award. Our weakest area will be vocational service, but we have excellent programs in all other areas.
- Individual Award: Sid Berlin won it last year--we may have to concede this to some other club.
- Paul Harris Award: See Rotary Foundation Award above.
- Public Relations: Under new direction, our public relations program has already produced results, and should continue to provide the community with a picture of our operations and contributions to its welfare.
- Bulletin Award: We have an excellent bulletin editor, with almost five years experience, and his bulletins have previously won the award. We will definitely be in contention for this award.
- Intl. Service:
(Bur Brunnier) We have won this award in the past, and will continue to participate in a variety of international programs to the benefit of our members and the world community. We could easily qualify for this award again.
- Voc'l Service: We have not been too successful in providing the variety of vocational service programs outlined in the awards booklet. We do have a new chairman who could make this a different year.
- Youth Service: We participate in a variety of youth activities, and these will be continued. We have had a scholarship fund using both current income and an endowment. This year we plan to begin an annual process of adding to our endowment fund to provide a better base for scholarship awards in the future (currently 5 @ \$500 and 1 @ \$1000).


The Scholarship Committee has recommended to the Board that the cash awards be increased from \$500.00 to \$1000.00 each.

LASTING FRIENDSHIPS HAVE BEEN MADE. MY DAUGHTER'S HOST YUKIKO SHIMADA AND HER FATHER, FLEW TO REDWOOD CITY FOR MARY'S WEDDING AND MASAKO ICHIKAWA, ANOTHER GUEST RETURNED ON HER HONEYMOON TO HAVE US MEET HER HUSBAND. MEMBERS OF THE HIRATSUKA ROTARY CLUB HAVE VISITED OUR CLUB ALMOST EVERY YEAR.

Subject: Plans and Activities for 1983-1984

The Rotary Club of Redwood City has sponsored--and looked after--the refugee family from Laos (Keo Vongsy family) for the past three years. Support for the family has been given in a variety of ways--assistance in dealing with public and private agencies, health, education, employment, insurance, house rental and maintenance. Financial aid has been provided in covering some health costs, initial rental costs, purchasing school clothes, supplying Christmas gifts, etc.

Considerable transportation service has been provided at times of need, along with counseling when a variety of problems have arisen.

There are six children in the family here, with the oldest, a son, still in a refugee camp in Thailand.

The highest priority right now is for orthodontia work for two of the girls. The preliminary work of filling cavities and extractions has been completed. Orthodontia work has already started, for Phannga. The Rotary Club has pledged \$1,000 for this work (estimated to take one and one-half years. In 6-9 months a second child very likely will begin orthodontia work, with additional financial support to be considered by the club. The orthodontist, a Rotarian, has been highly cooperative.

This is a very responsible family. The children range in age from 2 to 16--from pre-school to grade 10. The children have become fluent in the use of English, and are progressing satisfactorily in school. The father is gainfully employed (thanks to a Rotarian who owns the Hughes Plastic Co.).

The entire family attended a Rotary meeting in the fall of 1982. We plan to invite family members several times this year.

Our long-range responsibility is to assist the family in becoming essentially totally independent in order to function successfully in our society. Frankly we are pleased with the growth of this family and its willingness to face and accept responsibilities. Financially it is very difficult for them, but they are "hanging in there".
