Dear Fellow Rotarians:



### **A host of new RI Committees and task forces join the effort to help build the future**

The ambitious program I have set forth for the coming year has led me to appoint a number of new committees and task forces to help us accomplish our many goals. Among these are the Build the Future Committee, chaired by Past President Paulo V.C. Costa; the Committee for the 50th Commemoration of the Death of Founder Paul Harris, which I personally will head; and the Women in Future Society Committee, which is chaired by my wife Celia and charged with examining how Rotary can address the problems facing women today and how we can attract more women to join our ranks.

Other new committees include Latin America Affairs, Leadership Training Review, RI Travel Service Operations Review, Official History of Rotary and a Sergeant-at-Arms Academy, all of whose missions are obvious from their titles. I have reappointed a Preserve Planet Earth Committee, absent for several years from the committee roster, to help focus our efforts on protecting the environment for the New Generations.

A New Generations Task Force has also been named to help clubs and districts address the needs of this important segment of the population, and a New Members Education Task Force now stands ready to assist clubs and districts in educating new and existing Rotarians about the programs, history, and objectives of our organization. This year, we need to emphasize the importance of Rotary information as a membership-retention tool. The *Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws* have been amended to reflect that emphasis.

### **Wanted: Rotarians willing to go to the ends of the earth for peace**

In the months ahead, I'll be convening four important conferences, including the first peace forum in Antarctica.

During 15-17 November 1996, I will host a President's Conference on Eastern European Development in Prague, Czech Republic, to address the theme, *Our Future in a Changing World*. I invite you to meet with a host of Rotary leaders and concerned citizens to

explore the current situation in Eastern Europe and the opportunities for Rotary service on that new frontier. As this edition of *Future Issues* goes to press, I've just learned that District 2000 in Switzerland has generously donated US\$20,000 to pay the registration fees for one delegate from each club from the former Soviet-bloc countries (with the exception of the former German Democratic Republic).

On 10-11 December 1996, I have scheduled a Rotary/United Nations Conference for New Generations to be held in Buenos Aires, Argentina. We will examine the rights of children and the status of youth in Latin America. It will also be an opportunity to commemorate the 50th anniversary of two important UN programs — UNICEF and UNESCO — and I have no doubt that the UN representatives present will contribute greatly to our discussion.

During 9-12 January 1997, I will be hosting a Rotary Peace Forum in Antarctica. This icy and isolated continent at the tip of the Southern Hemisphere might seem an unlikely venue for a meeting of peacemakers until you consider that it's the only continent that has never experienced war. More important, Antarctica is one of our planet's last unspoiled reserves, and we owe it to the New Generations to protect its pristine environment and to preserve it as a land of peace. I invite you to join me in Ushuaia, Argentina, where our forum will commence. From there, we will fly to Antarctica and visit scientific and military outposts in the area. This month, I am inviting Rotary clubs around the world to send me their transcripts for peace — peace messages of 50-100 words in their native languages — that will be broadcast from Antarctica during our forum by members of the Rotarians of Amateur Radio (R.O.A.R.). Their participation assures that our message will be heard.

Finally, during 22-24 February 1997, I will travel to Cairo, Egypt, for the last of these crucial meetings, a President's Conference on Middle Eastern Development. There, I will be joined by the representatives of many countries to discuss how Rotary can grow in this vital region while increasing our service to the area. On 23 February, we will take time out to observe Rotary's 92nd anniversary at a special banquet. I hope you can join me for at least one of these meetings.



## **The *PLUS* of the 1996-97 Membership Challenge**

President Luis Vicente Giay has issued a personal challenge to all Rotary clubs "to increase membership, *plus* ensure retention by focusing on new member education." "The key to Rotary's future," he remarked, "is to make a true Rotarian out of every member."

To help achieve the *plus* of the president's challenge, the 1996-97 New Member Education Task Force has been established. For Rotary to remain viable into the next century, recruiting and continuing to develop Rotarians who embrace the high standards of service and ethics Rotary represents are imperative. The purpose of the task force is to provide districts and clubs with support and advice on utilizing effective education programs to ensure that all Rotarians achieve their full service potential.

The 1996-97 New Member Education Task Force will focus on two areas of education: the orientation of new members, and the continuing education of current members. A new and informative publication, *Strategies for New Member Education* (PD3-414), addresses both of these issues and will be instrumental in achieving the goals set by President Luis. This publication was distributed to all district governors-nominee at the 1996 International Assembly. Governors-nominee received sufficient copies to provide each club in the district with this information earlier this year. As General Coordinator of the 1996-97 New Member Education Task Force, I strongly encourage all Rotarians to become familiar with this important publication.

The primary responsibility for orienting and educating new members, as well as ensuring that there is a purposeful continuing education program available to current members, belongs at the club level. Encouraging personal involvement in club and district activities complements effective Rotary information to the benefit of both new and current members. For more information on developing effective new member education and continuing education programs, contact the task force member for your zone listed in the *1996-97 Official Directory*.

Focusing on both new member education and continuing education of current members will be significant elements in our success in the coming year as, together, we *Build the Future with Action and Vision*.

Your president and Membership Task Force will be excited and pleased if all districts reach their goals and are represented on stage at the Rotary Convention to receive a well-deserved standing ovation.


Here are some things that your club presidents can do to achieve their goals. First, reinforce to all club members that it is really a privilege and obligation of each and every Rotarian to propose new members.

## On the horizon: 1998 Council on Legislation

It's not too early to turn our attention to the 1998 Council on Legislation which is tentatively scheduled to convene 12-16 January 1998 in Delhi, India. While the dates of the meeting still might change, please be advised that the deadlines for the receipt of proposed legislation by the general secretary will not.

Enactments (proposals which seek to amend the Constitution or Bylaws of RI or the Standard Club Constitution) must be received by the general secretary by 1 May 1997. Resolutions (proposals which do not seek to amend the constitutional documents of RI but which express an opinion or make a recommendation to the RI Board) must be received by 14 October 1997.

## 76,785 and counting

We asked districts to set their own goals for growth in membership and new clubs as part of this year's Membership Challenge Plus and judging by the reports received to date, it's going to be a great year for Rotary. With almost 437 of our 518 districts reporting, the tally is nearly 77,000 new Rotarians ready to help build the future and more than 870 new clubs extending our Ideal of Service into new communities. I thank those districts for establishing ambitious goals and remind them to avail themselves of the services of our Membership and New Member Education Task Forces in carrying out their goals.





# FUTURE ISSUES

## FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY

Dear Fellow Rotarians:




In the July issue, I reported on several changes in the works at the Secretariat intended to streamline operations and improve service to Rotarians. This month, I am reporting on some other developments that show equal promise. Early indications suggest that the 15-18 June 1997 RI Convention at Glasgow will be exceedingly popular. An Olympic-style opening event is planned for Ibrox Stadium, with seating for 42,000.

Rotary International is in the process of developing a global corporate partnership program. Our goal is to enter into partnerships with international companies who can assist us in promoting Rotary programs. The RI Board, through the Licensing, Marketing and Sponsorship Committee, has been developing the concept of sponsorship on a limited basis for certain meetings and programs. We expect that the first corporate partnerships will be in place by the 1998 International Convention, although we may realize an earlier date for certain programs on a limited basis.

RI also has enhanced its strategies for registration of our intellectual property marks, such as the "Rotary" name and emblem. Formal registrations have increased to 35 nations, with as many as a dozen more to be launched over the next few years.

While we are on the subject of licensing, we are also in the process of finalizing our new licensing system. The refinements being made will assist in protecting our intellectual property rights, in addition to increasing revenue. During the 1994-95 Rotary year, royalty collection reached an all-time high of more than US\$800,000. The tally for this past Rotary year is not yet available, but additional refinements should continue to increase revenue and help defray the operating costs of the association.

Our actions will speak more forcefully than words. Without action, "Service Above Self" is merely an idealistic phrase. But action without vision is often wasted. Vision without action is just a dream. Action with vision brings hope to the world.

The future is here, waiting to be created. It is in our hands. **Build the Future with Action and Vision**, by:

**Honoring our Past.** Start a service project honoring the memory of Founder Paul Harris. Plan a local commemoration of Paul Harris on

the 50th anniversary of his death in January 1997. Participate in the awareness project, *Tell Your History of Rotary Service*, a narrative of your club's involvement in your community.

**Strengthening Membership.** Emphasize membership growth. Work for retention. Call upon members of the Rotary Membership Task Force for ideas and support.

**Bringing Quality into Vocational Service.** Seek excellence through high-quality standards. Guide young people to adopt worthwhile careers. Identify employment opportunities for the young. Recognize and dignify honest work. Use new technology to strengthen Rotary programs and information.

**Preparing New Generations.** Plan a Rotary Conference for New Generations. Be a mentor. Organize a Youth Leadership Seminar. Support your Interact and your Rotaract clubs, and encourage them to meet this year's presidential challenge.

**Working for Urban Peace.** Identify specific problems in your community. Sponsor a seminar teaching conflict-resolution skills. Volunteer for programs at the community level. Organize training in mediation skills and volunteering as mediators.

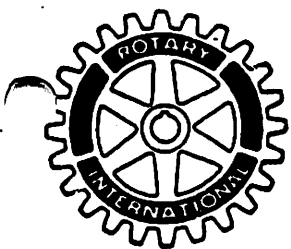

"The Redwood City Rotary Club is being credited for the addition of a slush freezer for the open heart surgery program at Sequoia Hospital in Redwood City. The club recently paid for more than three-quarters of the \$3,000 cost of the device, used in the hospital's cardiac surgery program, said hospital spokesman Tracy Lazar.

The freezer is used mainly to cool the heart during open-heart surgery.

The machine makes what resembles margarita ice, although the ice is a saline solution. The saline ice is wrapped in a sterile, cotton sponge, which is then placed directly on the heart. This helps in maintaining the cooler temperature needed for cardiac-muscle protection during open-heart procedures.

'The cooler the body is during bypass surgery, the less metabolic demand there is on the body,' said Donna McKinney, cardiovascular charge nurse in surgery. 'With the high volume of cases that we do at Sequoia, we really needed this new freezer.'

#### ROTARY PEACE CONFERENCE TO EXAMINE CAUSES OF URBAN VIOLENCE

In response to the spiraling increase in violence in many of the world's cities, RI President Luis Giay has called for seven regional Urban Peace Conferences to be held during 1996-97. The objective of the conferences is to examine the root causes of violence within the region and identify ways that Rotarians can promote peace in their own communities. Discussion topics will be specific to the problems in the region but may include homelessness, hunger, education, street children, poverty, and ethnic prejudice.

These one-day conferences will be held during July, August, and September in Bombay, India; Copenhagen, Denmark; Evanston, Illinois, U.S.A.; Johannesburg, South Africa; Kobe, Japan; São Paulo, Brazil; and Sydney, Australia.

All presidents of the first clubs formed in the 80 largest cities in the Rotary world will be invited to attend the conference in their regions. Their prominent role at the conferences is designed to re-establish the founding Rotary club as the leader among all the clubs in the city.

Clubs participating in each conference will be expected to initiate at least one major project designed to address the concerns raised. As a result of the conferences and the projects they generate, it is expected that Rotary will become increasingly visible as an organization working to improve the quality of urban life. Such active community participation should also attract new members who are interested in solving the problems plaguing large cities today.

# Rotary Foundation announces Permanent Fund Initiative


**A**t the Rotary International Convention in Calgary in June, The Rotary Foundation unveiled its Permanent Fund Initiative — a plan to build support for the Foundation's Permanent Fund. As part of the effort, districts will promote Rotary Foundation programs and emphasize continued annual giving.

The initial objective is to identify Rotarians and other potential donors capable of contributing US\$25,000 or more to The Rotary Foundation. The Foundation hopes that donors patiently cultivated by Permanent Fund district committees will make commitments to the Permanent Fund through planned gifts as well as outright and testamentary gifts.

Past President and Foundation Trustee Clifford L. Dochterman chairs the Permanent Fund Leadership Team, which is overseeing the plan. "Building the Permanent Fund is crucial to Rotary's future," Dochterman said. "But this isn't like PolioPlus, where we had an immediate, short-term goal to reach. This is a long-term plan to provide future Rotarians with the necessary resources to meet tomorrow's needs."

Training for 167 newly appointed Permanent Fund district chairpersons and deputy chairpersons from the U.S.A. and Canada will take place at RI World Headquarters in August. The Permanent Fund Initiative will be introduced to other countries later.

The 1995 Council on Legislation approved building the Permanent Fund as "a celebration of Rotary's approaching centenary and as a demonstration of commitment to Rotary as a movement for the centuries and a world leader in international service."

The Permanent Fund target is US\$200 million. As of 31 December 1995, the fund balance was US\$33 million. 

This past week our own PDG Bill Conklin represented our District 5150 at the Permanent Fund Initiative conference referenced above. Bill went to Evanston, Illinois on Wednesday August 14, and returned late Sunday. The training was an extension of the program he provided for us last month dealing with charitable giving in estate tax planning.

## 20 ANSWERS TO THE QUESTION:

# WHY JOIN ROTARY?

1. **Friendship** - In an increasingly complex world, Rotary provides one of the most basic human needs: the need for friends and fellowship. It is one of the two reasons why Rotary began in 1905.
2. **Business Development** - The second original reason for Rotary's beginning. Everyone needs to network. Rotary consists of a cross section of every business community. Its members come from all walks of life. Rotarians help one another, and collectively help others.
3. **Personal Growth and Development** - Membership in Rotary continues one's growth and education in human relations and personal development.
4. **Leadership Development** - Rotary is an organization of leaders and successful people. Serving in Rotary positions is like a college education in Leadership: learning how to motivate, influence and lead leaders.
5. **Citizenship in the Community** - Membership in a Rotary club makes one a better community citizen. The average Rotary club consists of the most active citizens of any community.
6. **Continuing Education** - Each week at Rotary, there is a program designed to keep one informed as to what is going on in the community, nation and world. Different speakers, different topics.
7. **Fun** - Rotary is fun. A lot of fun. Each meeting is fun. The club projects are fun. Social activities are fun. And the service is fun.
8. **Public Speaking Skills** - Many an individual who joined Rotary was afraid to speak in public. Rotary develops confidence and skill in public communication. And opportunity.
9. **Citizenship in the World** - Every Rotarian wears a pin that says: "Rotary International". And every Rotarian is welcome - even encouraged to attend - at 28,000 clubs in 188 nations and geographical regions. There are few places on the globe which do not have a Rotary club. Instant friends in both one's own community and in the world community.
10. **Assistance when Traveling** - Because there are Rotary clubs everywhere, many a Rotarian who has needed a doctor, lawyer, hotel, dentist, advice, etc., while traveling has found same quickly through Rotary.



11. **Entertainment** - Every Rotary club and district has parties and activities which provide diversion in one's business life. Rotary has conferences, conventions, assemblies and institutes which provide entertainment in addition to Rotary information, education and service.
12. **The Development of Social Skills** - Every week and at various events and functions, Rotary develops one's personality, social and people skills. Rotary is for people who like people, or who want to.
13. **Family Programs** - Rotary provides one of the world largest youth exchange programs; high school and college clubs for future Rotarians; spouse clubs and programs, and a host of activities designed to assist family members in growth and the development of family values.
14. **Vocational Skills** - Every Rotarian is expected to take a part in the growth and development of his or her own profession or vocation; to serve on committees and to teach youth about one's job or vocation. Rotary helps to make one a better doctor, lawyer, teacher (or whatever one does for a living) etc.
15. **The Development of Ethics** - Rotarians practice a 4-Way Test which governs one's ethical standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships.
16. **Cultural Awareness** - Around the world, practically every religion, country, culture, race, creed, political persuasion, language, color and ethnic identity is found in Rotary. It is a cross section of the world's most prominent citizens from every background. Rotarians become aware of other cultures and learn to love and work with people everywhere. They become better citizens of their countries in the process.
17. **Prestige** - Rotary members are prominent people: leaders of business, the professions, art, government, sports, military, religion and all disciplines. Rotary is the oldest and most prestigious service club in the world. Its ranks are executives, managers, professionals: people who make decisions and influence policy. Not everyone is invited to join Rotary.
18. **Nice People** - Rotarians above all are nice people; the nicest people on the face of the earth. They are important people who adhere to the policy that while it is nice to be important, it is more important to be nice.
19. **The Absence of "official creed"** - Rotary has no secret handshake, no secret policy, no official creed, no secret meetings or rituals. It is an open society - of men and women who simply believe in helping others.
20. **The Opportunity to Serve** - Rotary is a service club. Its business is mankind; its product is service. Rotarians provide community service - to both the local and international communities. This is the best reason perhaps for becoming a Rotarian: the chance to do something for somebody else. And to sense the self-fulfillment which comes in the process. And the return to one's own life. Rotarians believe in service above self; it is richly rewarding. **"HE PROFITS MOST WHO SERVES THE BEST"**.

# How to Propose a New Member

Every Rotarian has the privilege and obligation of seeking qualified members. In this way all club members can help their clubs achieve a full representation of the business and professional life of the community.

I understand that it will be my duty, if elected, to exemplify the Object of Rotary in all my daily contacts and activities, and to abide by the constitution and bylaws of the club. I understand that part of my membership dues will provide me an annual subscription to the official magazine or an approved and prescribed regional magazine as may be applicable. Any active member of this club may propose for, and the club may elect to, active membership one additional person who is actively engaged in the same classification of business or profession as that of the proposer. This individual must have the qualifications required for active membership.

Another provision permits a club to elect to active membership any *former* active member of a Rotary club who has established a business, practice, or residence in the community, even though that person's classification may already be represented. Here, approval of the present holder of the classification is needed.

Also permitted, with the approval of the present holder of the classification, is the election to additional active membership of former Rotaractors who have passed the age limit for Rotaract membership, provided that they live or conduct business within the territorial limits of the Rotary club, and were members of one or more Rotaract clubs for a minimum of four years.

In addition, your club's membership efforts should benefit greatly from an important change in policy effected by the 1995 Council on Legislation. Retired persons in your community are now eligible for past service membership in your club, even if they have never previously been Rotarians, provided that they would have been eligible for membership prior to retirement.

The basic procedure by which an individual is proposed for and elected to membership in a Rotary club is:

- The prospective member's name is submitted to the board of directors.
- The board ensures that the proposal meets all of the classification and membership requirements and approves or disapproves of the proposal within 30 days. The proposer is notified through the club secretary. (NOTE: Until this approval is granted, prospects should not be informed that they have been proposed for membership.)
- The prospective member is informed of privileges and responsibilities of Rotary club membership, asked to complete the application card, and to give written permission to publish his or her name and proposed classification to the club membership.
- Prospect's name is communicated to the club. If no objections are received by the board within seven days following the publication of the prospect's name, that person, upon payment of an admission fee, is considered to be elected to membership and his or her name is reported to Rotary International.

Additional active membership is an effective way of sharing the benefits of Rotary membership with outstanding, service-minded business and professional leaders in your community. It can bring to your club new members with fresh enthusiasm, contribute extra support to your club's program of service, strengthen club leadership, and help lower the average age of club members.

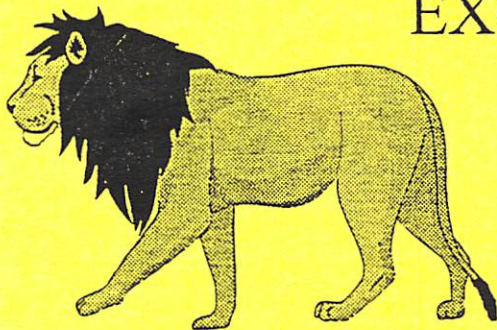

Dear Fellow Rotarians,



Many thoughts are on my mind this month as I pause in the business of Rotary to write to you, my esteemed friends and colleagues.

First, I would like to express my deep appreciation to the district governors who have accepted this year's Membership Challenge Plus and have followed its guidelines in setting their goals for Rotary's growth. To date, 449 Rotary districts have responded. These 449 "governors plus" have set a goal to bring in 78,582 new members and to organize 905 new clubs during this Rotary year. These numbers represent the ambitions and hopes of great leaders, and I am confident that we — all current, past, and future Rotary officers — will do our utmost to support these ambitious efforts being undertaken in our districts. If Rotary is to be equipped to face the problems of the next millennium, it is essential to maintain an appropriate rate of membership growth and membership retention. I thank each and every one of you for your cooperation and assistance.

And while we prepare for the future, we must never forget the contributions of those who came before us. Rotary has been built through the efforts of our volunteer Rotarians and the Secretariat staff worldwide. Let me acknowledge the excellent service of four staff members whose retirement in 1996 marks the end of their remarkable careers at Rotary: Jean Ann Ziegler, Dorothy Young, Felipe González, and Norma Mujica. Jean Ann and Dorothy were both with Rotary for 42 years, Felipe served in the Latin America Department for more than 39 years, and Norma devoted a great deal of her 34 years with the organization to the publication of the *Official Directory* and the compilation of RI's database. As President of RI in 1996-97, I have recognized and expressed our appreciation to all of these colleagues as they embarked upon their retirement. I know that you all join me in wishing them every happiness in this new phase of their lives. May the years ahead hold many joys for these good friends and longtime associates.

This year we plan to honor the past of our organization and, on 27 January 1997, the 50th anniversary of the death of Rotary's Founder, Paul Harris. I urge all Rotary clubs to develop a local community project during that week to honor the memory of this Rotarian visionary. My suggestion to Rotary clubs for an effective public relations angle and a good way to promote awareness of your service endeavors is to "Tell Your History of Service."

No doubt that history includes your club's service to young people, the New Generations. I call upon you, my friends and Rotary leaders, to reflect upon the importance of our commitment to the New Generations and to renew your pledge to lend them your support. Almost 50 percent of the world's population today is under 30 years of age; however, they constitute 100 percent of the future.


Having now participated in three Presidential Visits for New Generations, I want to share with you my excitement regarding the unqualified success of these events. We have heard testimony from young people and adults that would deeply touch every audience. The scope and importance of Rotary's efforts in the past in the arena of youth service are invaluable. Within the initiative of Rotary



for the New Generations, I am certain that we will continue along that road and will greatly reinforce the impact of our youth programs. I appeal to each of you to exercise your leadership and be the moving force in each of your clubs for the organization of a Conference for New Generations within your community. After the conference, you will remember these words: "A young man or woman is the raw material from which we will mold a person of strong and noble character." My dear friends, let's roll up our sleeves and get to work! **Let's Build the Future by preparing the New Generations.**

On a related note, please keep in mind that this year we have announced a Challenge for Rotaract and for Interact in an attempt to strengthen these young people's groups and offer them our full support. In recent years, the number of Interact clubs has decreased dramatically. Rotaract statistics appear somewhat more steady. Perhaps this is because the age span of members allows these young people to participate for a longer stretch of time, thus adding a dimension of permanence to their clubs. Yet, we have districts with more than four thousand Rotarians and more than fifty clubs whose Rotaract and Interact club numbers are only in the single-digit range. We must understand that by working together with the New Generations, we will not only help to make better citizens for tomorrow, but we will also help to *Build the Future with Action and Vision*. I hope that every Rotary club will sponsor an Interact or Rotaract club this year.

## FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY

Dear Fellow Rotarians,



In October, the staff at World Headquarters will embark on a major reorganisation of our workspace, a consolidation which will increase the proportion of One Rotary Center available for leasing to tenants, while improving efficiency and inter-departmental communication. The end result will be better service to our members and increased revenue for our organisation. However, the project will not be completed without some inconvenience. If you've ever attempted to solve Rubik's cube, or one of those plastic number puzzles

where you slide numbered squares around in a grid with one empty space until the numbers are all in their proper sequence, you know exactly what we are up against.

At present, only two percent of the entire building is vacant. That is a fact of which we are normally quite proud, since it shows how effective our leasing strategy has been. In this instance, with much of the staff needing to be temporarily relocated during this remodeling effort, it poses some severe logistical problems. Fortunately, almost all of the inconvenience will be to us, and not to you, the members of our great organisation.

During the construction, which we expect will be completed before the end of the current Rotary year, we are committed to keeping all parts of our operation up and running. In order to gain maximum cost benefit from this investment, while the carpeting has been taken up, we will also be upgrading the ageing electrical wiring and the computer network cabling, both of which would have to be done shortly in any event. This could result in some short-term communication delays. Please bear with us if this does occur.

Speaking of improvements to our computer network, we are also in the process of installing new and fully-integrated financial software. To date, we have successfully implemented the general ledger and accounts payable modules.

To realise our great potential as an organisation dedicated to service, I hope that leaders in every Rotary district will adopt and adapt the District Leadership Plan to best suit the needs of their clubs. In doing so, they will demonstrate their commitment to *Build the Future with Action and Vision*.

## FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY



Dear Fellow Rotarians,

As we begin this new Rotary year with President Luis, I am pleased to announce several important changes currently being undertaken at the Secretariat. These improvements should make our efforts to serve you and other Rotarians worldwide even more efficient than before. Plans are now being made to equip the service centers in Japan, Korea, Delhi (South Asia), and Manila (Southeast Asia) with personal computers, significantly increasing their service capability and enabling E-Mail communication with the World Headquarters in Evanston.

In the coming weeks, a new membership database will be implemented, replacing multiple, redundant, inflexible databases currently existing. This will allow all staff providing service to Rotarians to access a single database for mailings, officer appointments, club and district information and other vital service information. It will eliminate duplicate mailings, and reduce the time it takes to distribute information. It will also allow for flexible reporting from our system, and this will greatly enhance the services which we provide to Governors, Directors and Trustees.

Also in 1996-97, a new financial system will be implemented that will integrate all of the various aspects of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation's financial applications. These systems should provide for improved financial control and reporting and allow for more understandable club billing.

A host of important Rotary meetings are scheduled for the months ahead.

Presidential Conferences for Development are now being finalized for 15-17 November 1996 in Prague, Czech Republic and for 22-24 February 1997 in Cairo, Egypt. A first-ever Rotary Peace Forum in Antarctica is set for 10-12 January 1997. Also, a special commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Ambassadorial Scholarships program is taking shape, to be held 5-6 March 1997 in Los Angeles, California.

In coming months, I look forward to sharing more with you about our work at World Headquarters and our continued efforts to improve service to the membership of the organization.

John has been involved in the Sheriff's STAR Program, a recreation and training course focused towards children from the inner cities. The program provides the children with an outdoor experience. The idea originated with Sgt. Tim McHenry who has had a long association with the Boy Scout explorer movement.

The course takes fifth graders to the Cutter Scout Reservation near Pescadero and provides a camping, adventure experience to kids that otherwise have no contact with the outdoors.

Law enforcement Explorers from organized Scout units help with the camp training. Activities include archery, small bore target shooting, boating, fishing and swimming. The idea is to reward good kids and to help young people that may be at risk.

In 1995 the program, an outgrowth of the DARE drug awareness campaign, hosted 60 10 to 17 year olds. This year, 84 kids were given the opportunity to participate. John is an enthusiastic supporter of the program and hopes it will continue forever.

Dr. Sidney Marchasin spoke to us about the state of the health care industry in the USA and here in Redwood City. Sid has been proactive in the health care field as a practicing physician and as a former member of the Sequoia Hospital Board. He is presently on the Board of Bay Care Medical Group in San Francisco.

### SEQUOIA CLUB

Sid acknowledged that everyone wants comprehensive health care but, we, the people, don't want to pay for it. Costs have risen in the field due to inflation and the advent of high technology in diagnostics and treatment. Such things as by-pass surgery, intensive care units, coronary care units, CAT scans, MRIs endoscopy and angeoplasty didn't exist 25 years ago. Each new item of technology has a price tag in capital cost and personnel that is passed on to the consumer.

Sid noted that the problem began with the government in 1983. There were changes in Federal and State legislation that reimbursed hospitals on a fixed schedule. the costs have gone up by inflation, but the schedule of payments has remained at 1983 levels. This coupled with the requirements of the government and insurers to complete endless reams of paperwork has sent medical costs skyrocketing. Sequoia Hospital alone has 140 employees just to do the mandated paperwork for government and insurers.

When the government dropped the funding for health care services, the private insurers filled the vacuum. Sid is convinced that private, for profit, insurance companies run our health care system today. He thinks that they are more concerned with dividends for shareholders and huge salaries for executives than for patient care.

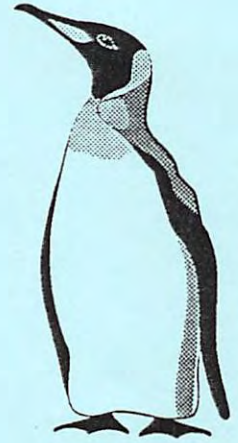

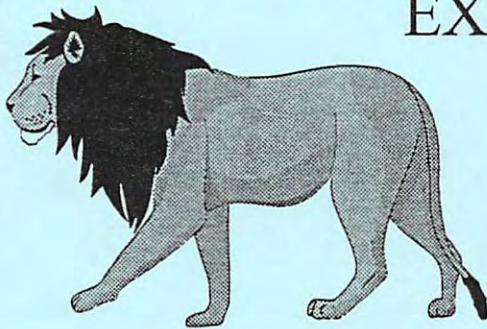

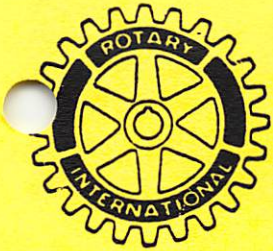

# Future Issues

## FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY

Dear Fellow Rotarians:



In the July issue, I reported on several changes in the works at the Secretariat intended to streamline operations and improve service to Rotarians. This month, I am reporting on some other developments that show equal promise. Early indications suggest that the 15-18 June 1997 RI Convention at Glasgow will be exceedingly popular. An Olympic-style opening event is planned for Ibrox Stadium, with seating for 42,000.

Rotary International is in the process of developing a global corporate partnership program. Our goal is to enter into partnerships with international companies who can assist us in promoting Rotary programs. The RI Board, through the Licensing, Marketing and Sponsorship Committee, has been developing the concept of sponsorship on a limited basis for certain meetings and programs. We expect that the first corporate partnerships will be in place by the 1998 International Convention, although we may realize an earlier date for certain programs on a limited basis.

RI also has enhanced its strategies for registration of our intellectual property marks, such as the "Rotary" name and emblem. Formal registrations have increased to 35 nations, with as many as a dozen more to be launched over the next few years.

While we are on the subject of licensing, we are also in the process of finalizing our new licensing system. The refinements being made will assist in protecting our intellectual property rights, in addition to increasing revenue. During the 1994-95 Rotary year, royalty collection reached an all-time high of more than US\$800,000. The tally for this past Rotary year is not yet available, but additional refinements should continue to increase revenue and help defray the operating costs of the association.

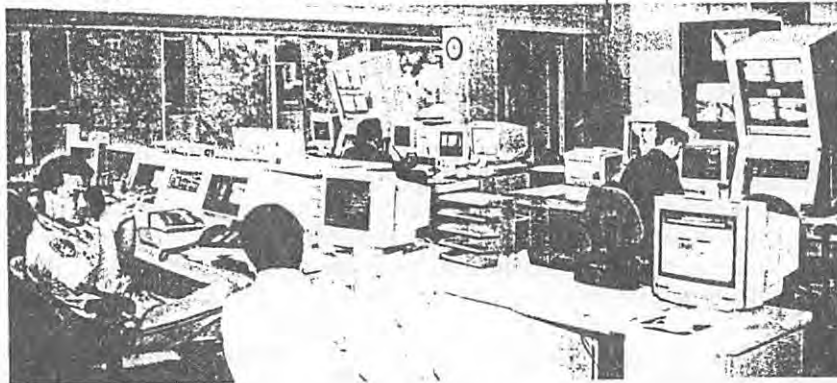

Enhanced operations has been gained through better coordination of response activities and timely dissemination of traveler information from the co-location of the Caltrans maintenance dispatch operations and the TravInfo Traveler Information Center (TIC) in the TMC. Thus, the Oakland TMC is a central transportation information source for gathering and dissemination of real-time transportation information. The TMC facility in Oakland is operational 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and staffing consists of engineers, CHP personnel, maintenance personnel, technicians, dispatchers, part-time students, and TIC operators.

The total build-out of the Oakland TMC is expected to be completed by late 1997 and will become the Regional Transportation Management Center (RTMC). Real-time traffic information will be color-coded and displayed on a district status map and shown on a large screen graphics display wall in the RTMC. Situations that indicate severe traffic congestion or a lane blocking incident will trigger flashing red lights at the problem location on the map display. RTMC personnel may then use the CCTV to verify an incident and dispatch appropriate tow services or emergency response forces to quickly clear the roadway and minimize freeway congestion and delay.



The RTMC will cover the coastal California region from the Oregon border to approximately Santa Barbara. The existing TMC facility at Vallejo will be converted to a backup facility starting in June 1996, and will be unmanned most of the time unless the Oakland TMC becomes inoperable and requires the Vallejo facility to be activated.

### Ultimate Traffic Operations System (TOS) & Benefits

The RTMC is expected to ultimately operate a 500 mile Traffic Operations System (TOS) freeway network in the Bay Area. This will include 150 Changeable Message Signs, 450 Closed Circuit TV cameras, and 20 permanent Highway Advisory Radios. In addition, approximately 2500 directional roadway detectors installed 1/3 to 1/2 mile spacing on the roadway in each lane will provide real-time traffic information to the RTMC operators at the center.

The total cost of all the TOS projects is estimated to be \$300 million and could be completed within 10 years if funding continues to be available.

The benefits derived from the Bay Area Traffic Operations System are expected to far outweigh the cost. These benefits include: reduction in motorist delay through improved incident management; improved traveler information allowing motorists to select the best transportation option; optimized freeway traffic flows through metering and other transportation management techniques; safety through reduced secondary accidents; fuel savings; and reduced motorist frustration and stress.

Assuming 1996 conditions, the TOS is expected to save millions of vehicle hours of delay, reduce accidents by 15%, and save hundreds-of-thousands of gallons of fuel each year. Considering capital cost amortization and annual operating and maintenance costs, for each \$1 spent on the TOS, \$7 is returned from direct benefits. This conservative ratio does not include intangible benefits such as reduction in air pollutants and relief of driver stress and inconvenience due to the elimination of stop-and-go traffic conditions. Thus, through the operation of RTMC and the ultimate build-out of the TOS, the travelling public will be provided the maximum efficiency throughout the transportation systems in the Bay Area.



## TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT CENTER DISTRICT 04

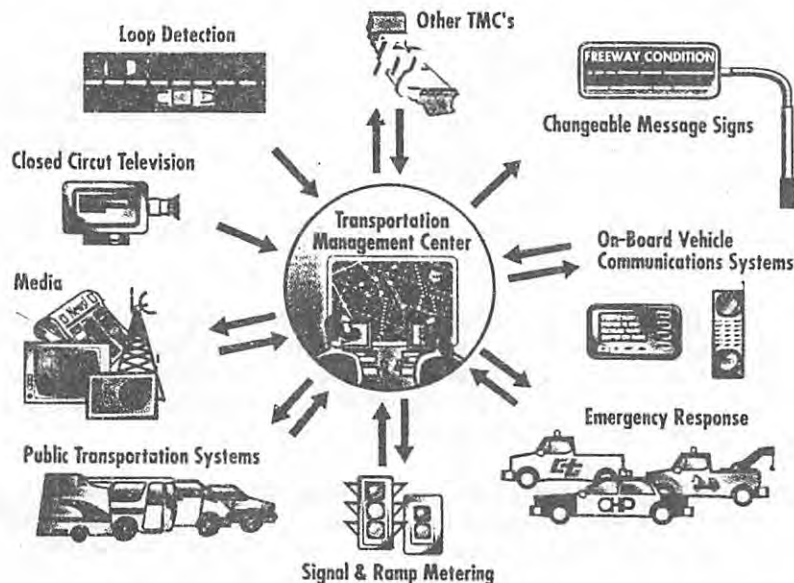
### BACKGROUND & PURPOSE OF THE TMC:

The Transportation Management Center (TMC) was established in July, 1992, and was located in the city of Vallejo at the California Highway Patrol Golden Gate Division Communications Center facility until June 1996. The new TMC facility is located in the Caltrans District 4 Headquarters building at 111 Grand Avenue in Oakland.

The purpose of the TMC is to monitor a continuous flow of transportation data and respond to freeway incidents and road conditions 24 hours a day. The TMC provides traffic surveillance, traffic management, traveler information and coordination with other agencies. The TMC is equipped with computers, communications equipment and displays to collect and analyze data, suggest plans of actions and execute operator approved actions.

Information about accidents, road/lane closures, and emergency notifications are fed into this information hub to be disseminated to public and private information users. Field data from roadway detectors, closed circuit television cameras, call boxes, cellular 911 calls to the CHP and information from the CHP computer-aided dispatch (CAD) system will be routed into the TMC via state-of-the-art communications system. The response activities initiated by the TMC operators may include activations of Changeable Message Signs, dispatch of Traffic Management Team units, maintenance response units and/or tow services, ramp metering adjustments, input of voice recorded messages for broadcast via Highway Advisory Radio & California Highway Information Network systems, notification of incidents to media, local cities & agencies, and alternative route coordination with the CHP and local police.

The current TMC facility occupies approximately 14,000 square feet on two adjacent floors and includes an Emergency Resource Center (ERC) for major incident coordination. The new facility includes a generator and battery backup power supply, sleeping quarters for staff members that may be required to stay on-site for extended periods during emergencies, kitchen facilities and a separate water supply from the main building.

## HOW YOUR RETIREMENT PLAN MAY CHANGE IN 1997

President Clinton recently signed into law the Small Business Job Protection Act. While this bill includes provisions for increasing the minimum wage, it will also affect many aspects of business retirement plans and individual retirement accounts (IRAs). A little background on the specifics of this new legislation may help you determine how you or your business may be affected.

Among the changes that will be effective as of January 1, 1997:

- \* Increased contributions to spousal IRAs. Starting next year, each spouse can contribute up to \$2,000 each year (\$4,000 total) to a spousal IRA, even if one spouse does not work. Previously, a nonworking spouse could only contribute up to \$250 annually to a spousal IRA, while a working spouse could contribute up to \$2,000 annually (\$2,250 per household). Individuals are still limited to \$2,000 for annual contributions to an individual IRA.
- \* "SIMPLE" plan created. According to the new legislation, no new Salary Reduction Simplified Employee Pension plans (SAR-SEPS) can be established after Dec. 31, 1996. However, if your company currently has a SAR-SEP plan in place, it will be allowed to keep and maintain it under current regulations.

To replace SAR-SEPS, the new legislation creates a "SIMPLE" retirement plan available to employers with fewer than 100 employees. The Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees (SIMPLE) will allow employees to save up to \$6,000 annually by contributing pretax salary dollars to an IRA or 401(k) trust. Similar to a 401(k), this plan also gives employers a choice of matching employees' tax-deferred contributions dollar for dollar up to 3% of the employees' compensation or making contributions equal to 2% of compensation for each eligible employee.

- \* Changes in mandatory retirement plan distribution. Qualified plan participants who continue to work beyond age 70 1/2 will no longer be required to take minimum distributions from their retirement plan until they retire. However, the minimum mandatory distribution requirement at age 70 1/2 still applies to their IRAs and to those who own 5% of their employer's business.
- \* 401(k) plans available to non-profit organizations. For the first time, certain tax-exempt organizations (specifically, credit unions and Native American tribes) will be able to establish a 401(k) plan or other plan type alternatives.
- \* Changes for highly compensated employees. The definition of "highly compensated employees" has been changed, which could affect both the employee's and company's contribution amounts to retirement plans.
- \* Five-year averaging repealed after Dec. 31, 1999. Five-year averaging is a technique that allows recipients of retirement plan distributions to calculate the amount of tax due on the distribution as if it is received over five years. This tax-planning technique generally produces a lower overall tax bill; however, it will no longer be allowed for most individuals after Dec. 31, 1999.

While these are just some of the changes, you may want to ask your employer or investment professional to see if these changes allow you more opportunities to build your retirement nest egg.

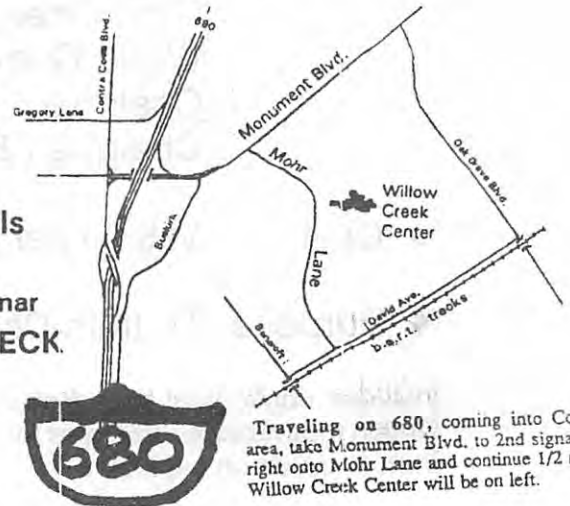

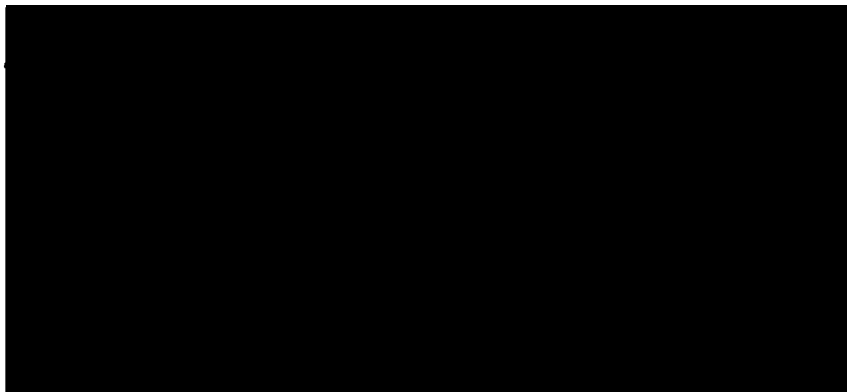

She gave us a look at the Waco fire, the Oklahoma City explosion, and how the Menendez brothers shot their parents.

Angela said that 99.9% of the time problems resulting in failures are caused by people using products wrong. Disasters are a chain of events that at some point get out of hand.

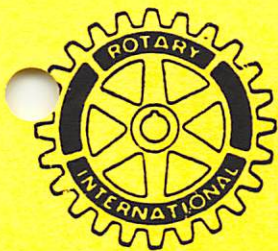

## GSE ( GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE) WITH FINLAND/ESTONIA

Our District will exchange GSE teams this year with District # 1420 in Helsinki, Finland/Estonia. The team will leave April 5, 1997 and return May 10, 1997. The District is looking for team members. Each Club can sponsor up to two (2) members.

GSE is a unique educational experience by providing an opportunity for outstanding business and professional people to study an other country, its people, culture and institutions, through personal contacts with Rotarians, their families and others.

### QUALIFICATIONS OF TEAM MEMBERS

The Team member can not be a Rotarian or related to a Rotarian, must have been employed for at least two years pursuing a career in a recognized area( law, medicine, dentistry, real estate, government positions, retailers, wholesalers, etc).

Although familiarity with and speaking command with the Finish and/or Estonian language is preferred, it is not a requirement.

The Team member, must, within five days of selection provide authorization from his/her employer guaranteeing that he or she is available for the trip. There will be some incidental expenses, such as appropriate clothing, gifts for the host families which houses the member and some small souvenirs for people they encounter along the way.

Rotary will pay round trip airfare. The Rotarians in District #1420 will provide transportation, food and lodging while they are there.

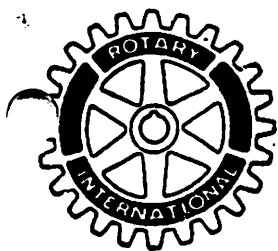
Because the team members will be moving from family to family, the questions will become repetitive, but it will be new information for the people asking them. They will be attending Rotary meetings on all different times and presenting the program. The team members will be expected to give presentations about themselves, their living area and their profession.

When they return , they will have an obligation to share information about the trip, not only to the sponsoring club, but with various Rotary Clubs in our District. They will need to speak at the District Conference to be held May 16-18 in Sacramento.

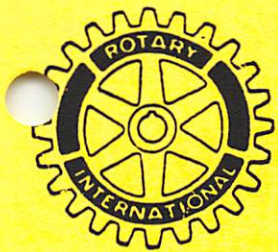

## Counseling

- 1) **Pastoral** - The Salvation Army officers are ordained ministers. They provide Christian counseling, marital and family counseling, and assist those experiencing a spiritual crisis or other problems related to their faith in God.

- 2) **Material Assistance** - Meals, lodging, cash grants, food orders, clothing, rent, transportation and other material assistance is given to qualified individuals and families.
- 3) **Food Baskets** - Food basket programs provide donated and USDA emergency food to individuals and families.
- 4) **Shelter** - Emergency lodging transitional housing or residential living for families and individuals.
- 5) **Services to the Homeless** - showers and special food boxes requiring no cooking.

## Planned Giving

This service provides information to help individuals attain their financial and charitable goals through appropriate charitable gift planning techniques which yield benefits under current charitable tax law.

## Service Extension

The Salvation Army has service extension units in the areas where Salvation Army Community Centers do not exist. Each service unit functions in cooperation with a representative committee of local citizens. Types of services provided by these units range from medical and dental attention to supplying fuel, food and clothing for the destitute.

## Community Services

Ron McKinney of the Salvation Army told us about the workings of that great organization. The Army was founded in 1865 in London by a Methodist minister. The first red kettle was used in San Francisco in 1881 at the Ferry Building, a very busy place at that time. The money raised by the Christmas bell ringing brings about 1/3 of the Army' revenue.

Congress has recognized the Salvation Army and has mandated it as one of the agencies to provide disaster relief throughout the USA. The Army opened a facility in Redwood City in 1960 when it bought the church at Jefferson and Clinton Streets.

The Army works with alcohol abusers, and drug users. It provides an adult rehabilitation program which is run without any federal or state money. It provides job training and educational programs to help put people to work.

The \$74 million per year raised by the Army makes it the largest charity in the United States except for the government



itself. With a 14% overhead factor it is one of the most efficiently run charities as well as one of the largest.

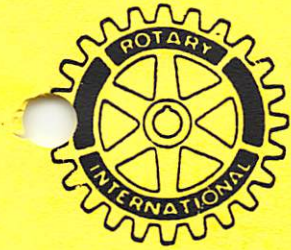

Tom Rogers the curator at Filoli gave us insight and history about the great estate in Woodside. The house was built after the '06 earthquake by William Bohren the owner of a gold mine in Nevada City. He could build in Woodside since he did not have to rely on the railroad as did the earlier builders of estates in San Mateo County such as Crocker, Carolines and Ralston. The mansion was completed in 1917.

The Roths, members of the Matson Navigation family bought the property in 1937. Upon her death in 1975, Mrs.



Roth willed the property to the National Trust. Even though the Government owns the property, it is operated and funded from local resources. There are 250 docents at Filoli, all from a total of 900 volunteers.

Revenue for operations comes from tours and from rentals by movie and TV production companies. Tours produce about \$50,000 a year, but a more efficient revenue stream comes from movies. We have seen the property in *Dynasty*, *Heaven Can Wait*, *The Joy Luck Club* and *Lolita*. Upcoming pictures include *The Game* and *George of the Jungle*. One movie rental is equal to about 900 tours and is kinder to the well being of the property.

One thing was agreed by everyone, Filoli is a local treasure to be cherished by all.

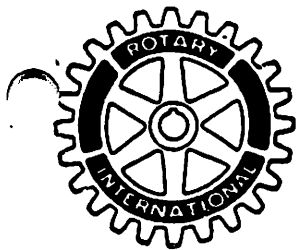

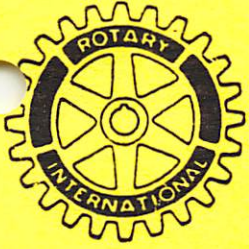

Dear friends:



For many years we have emphasized the need for growth and its importance for the future of Rotary. Today, more than ever, I am convinced that we should intensify our efforts to maintain our organization's progress in increasing individual membership as well as in promoting service work.

This year, continuing the encouraging pace of membership growth recorded in 1995-96 under President Herb Brown's leadership, we are devoting even more energy to Rotary advancement. Our "Challenge Plus," which consists of the goals set by more than 450 districts, is already heading towards success. By the end of November, sixteen districts — one in Mexico, another in Great Britain & Ireland, and the remainder in Asia — had attained their extension goals. One district in Taiwan, China, had organized sixteen new clubs!

According to the reports received by Rotary International from district governors in their monthly letters, the net membership increase worldwide exceeded 18,500 at the end of November. Because a key element for our growth is the retention of new Rotarians, a special task force was created to advocate rapid involvement and complete assimilation of recently admitted members through implementation of our "Strategies for New Member Education." Approximately 40 percent of all Rotarians have been members for less than two years, and it is they to whom we must turn our attention. New members, having shown an interest in embracing our organization, deserve a warm, sincere welcome and unhesitating acceptance by fellow Rotarians.


I want to mention specifically two possible effects that a dynamic growth spurt may have on the future of our organization. The first deals with the quantity and quality of the services that we offer. Numbers alone certainly do not guarantee the ability to serve, but the number of able and willing volunteers and their allegiance to the ideal of service are the only resources on which Rotary can count to accomplish its laudable humanitarian programs.

The second effect has to do with the income that our organization receives from per capita dues. Given the fiscal needs of Rotary districts and our service projects, a slow rate of growth would soon force us to consider an increase in per capita dues in order to keep our finances on an even keel.



All Rotarians are included in these reflections, but foremost in my thoughts on this issue are the leaders responsible for extension and membership development work and our "Governors Plus." I know that we shall all redouble our efforts to increase the ranks of our members and clubs as we **BUILD THE FUTURE WITH ACTION AND VISION.**

## **Outstanding Rotaract growth**

An 8.5 percent jump forward in the number of Rotaract clubs worldwide is an excellent achievement, one in which we can take just pride. We have seen remarkable progress in the organization of new Rotaract clubs, and these clubs have, in turn, proceeded to increase the scope of the services they provide to their communities, thus responding effectively to the President's Rotaract Challenge. The RI Rotaract Committee, chaired by Past Director James Speer from Covina, California, U.S.A., is working ardently and has prepared an exciting program for the pre-convention Rotaract meeting in Glasgow on Saturday, 14 June.

## **Interact also records significant increases**

Thanks to the initiative of the Interact Committee, chaired by Past District Governor Salomón Pesel of Mexico City, this year the Interact program has turned around the downward trend observed in the recent past. Our goal this year is to achieve a 10 percent increase in the number of Interact clubs, a goal that requires the combined efforts of all Rotarians. Recently, during a Presidential Visit for New Generations in Malaysia, I had the opportunity to see for myself the advances made by Interact in that country, where Interact clubs are an integral element of the nation's educational system. The high level of activity of the Interact clubs in Malaysia is wonderful to see! While there are approximately twelve hundred Rotarians in the country, Interact members number sixteen thousand!

## **Representatives to next Council on Legislation**

Once again, I urge all our leaders to elect the best qualified Rotarian from each district to represent them at the next Council on Legislation. This is an event that offers us an opportunity every three years to introduce changes to keep Rotary in step with contemporary developments.

## **Honoring the memory of Paul Harris**

We will mark on 27 January the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Paul P. Harris, the Chicago attorney whose legacy to the world was the spirit of friendship without frontiers, a lasting gift that allows volunteers from all nations to unite under the Rotary banner. Organizing activities which focus on this anniversary is a fitting means to honor the memory of our founder. To this end, I have asked clubs to organize "Service Project Displays" with the aim of keeping alive in the heart of every community the achievements of the past and the commitments we have assumed for the future.

## **President's Conference on Middle Eastern Development draws near**

On 22-24 February 1997, Rotary leaders from around the world will join me in Cairo, Egypt, for the last of this year's presidential conferences. Together, we will examine ways that Rotary can add to its ranks and increase its level of service in the Mediterranean Basin and the Middle East.

Rotary's Programs for New Generations is also on the agenda, and we will examine issues related to health, employment, ethics and partnerships in service affecting youth in this turbulent region. In workshops, we will focus on effective ways to implement our program and I have no doubt that the Conference for New Generations which directly precedes the meeting will also contribute greatly to our understanding of the role that we must play.

On the evening of 23 February, I will host a special banquet with entertainment to celebrate the 92nd anniversary of the founding of our great organization. I hope you'll join me for this memorable event.

**FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY**

Dear Fellow Rotarians:



Sometimes as I sit in my office on the 18th floor of One Rotary Center, it's hard to imagine that Room 711, the place where Rotary began, is now situated only two floors below me. There, on the 16th floor of World Headquarters, visitors can find mining engineer Gustavus Loehr's office, faithfully transplanted from its former site, the since-demolished Unity Building in downtown Chicago.

But if Gus were alive today, he, in turn, might find the room across the hall far more interesting. The Paul Harris Room, long a fixture at the World Headquarters, is a faithful replica of the office Paul maintained at the Secretariat prior to his death in 1947. From the elegant desk, which was a gift from Australian Rotarians, to the chess board made of iridescent butterfly wings, which came from Rotarians in India, the room speaks volumes about the founder and the esteem in which he was held by those who met him.

At the entryway, a life-size statue of Paul with outstretched hand greets all visitors. The statue, a gift of the Rotarians of Japan, was the combined work of two generations of Japanese sculptor-Rotarians. In 1935, Paul Harris sat for a bust designed by Isao Morioko. The detailed information and plans prepared by Isao were used by his son Kimihiko in creating the statue.

It is my sincere hope that all Rotarians will one day have the opportunity to visit these two rooms. For that reason, we are in the process of moving the central reception area, previously located on the 15th floor, one floor higher to the 16th, guaranteeing you'll receive a truly historic reception when you visit the World Headquarters. This move is expected to be completed by mid-January.

If you are planning a trip to Evanston to visit One Rotary Center, a guided tour of the facility can be arranged in advance of your visit. I recommend that you contact Hank Ottery in Human Resources to ensure that a guide will be available to show you the World Headquarters.
