




 - 1: FORMAT:
 - a) Appearance;

The Rotary Club of Redwood City many years ago made a basic decision to eschew glamour for the sake of thrift. Winning the award of "Best Bulletin" could be achieved by spending money for pre-printed paperstock with shadows of Rotary emblems backrounding the text. It also could be done by printing on offset presses with half tone pictures included in the publication. The Rotary Club of Redwood City has considered these alternatives and rejected them because of their expense. We believe that our money is better spent on our pursuit of the four avenues of service than on fancy and expensive printing.

We further believe in distributing the bulletin at our meetings, again in an attempt to conserve costs.

We would suggest that the committee judging the bulletins ask the question "How much do you spend for the production and mailing of your bullettin"? Redwood City's cost has been less than \$20 per week to produce and distribute our bulletin for a Club averaging 80 to 85 members. This includes a mailing to all members that did not attend the meeting for which the bulletin was published.

b) Readability:

The Rotary Club of Redwood City started, in July of 1986, to experiment with the amount of content that could be included in a bulletin. To achieve more editorial content in the available space we experimented with formating on 11"x17" paper see (exhibits A & B hereto) and using the reduction capability of the modern copy machine to achieve this end. The first attempt (a reduction of 50% July, 1986) was a smashing success for content but

left the members squinting. Subsequent experiments determined that an 85% reduction from the size of a standard typewriter equalled normal newspaper type size.

The experimentation, however, continued and by experimenting with paper sizes, type styles and formats we made a trial run issue for Christmas. We attempted to return to typewriter sized print and still maintain those elements of our bulletin appreciated by our members, which includes a weekly reproduction of our Club roster. The result was a revamping of the format. Beginning, March 10, 1987, (exhibit C hereto) we published a four page folded bulletin, which provides ample room for editorial comment while preserving the basic integrity of the time honored, Rotary Spoke of Redwood City.

2: CONTENT:

Each week the Rotary Spoke of the Rotary Club of Redwood City provides the members with an agenda and introduction to the program for the current meeting; a synopsis of what took place at the last meeting; a preview of the next meeting; and news and notes of significant happenings, as well as, a reminder of future events. In addition we have provided important information throughout the year on those items referred to in the Awards Booklet of District 513. The attached Bulletins are in chronological order from July 1, 1986, to February 28, 1987. Each paragraph of each bulletin has a number written alongside. References for each item of content refers to the date of the bulletin and the appropriate paragraph.

eg: 7.1=6 refers to the July 1, 1986, bulletin at paragraph 6, which references our annual installation dinner.
