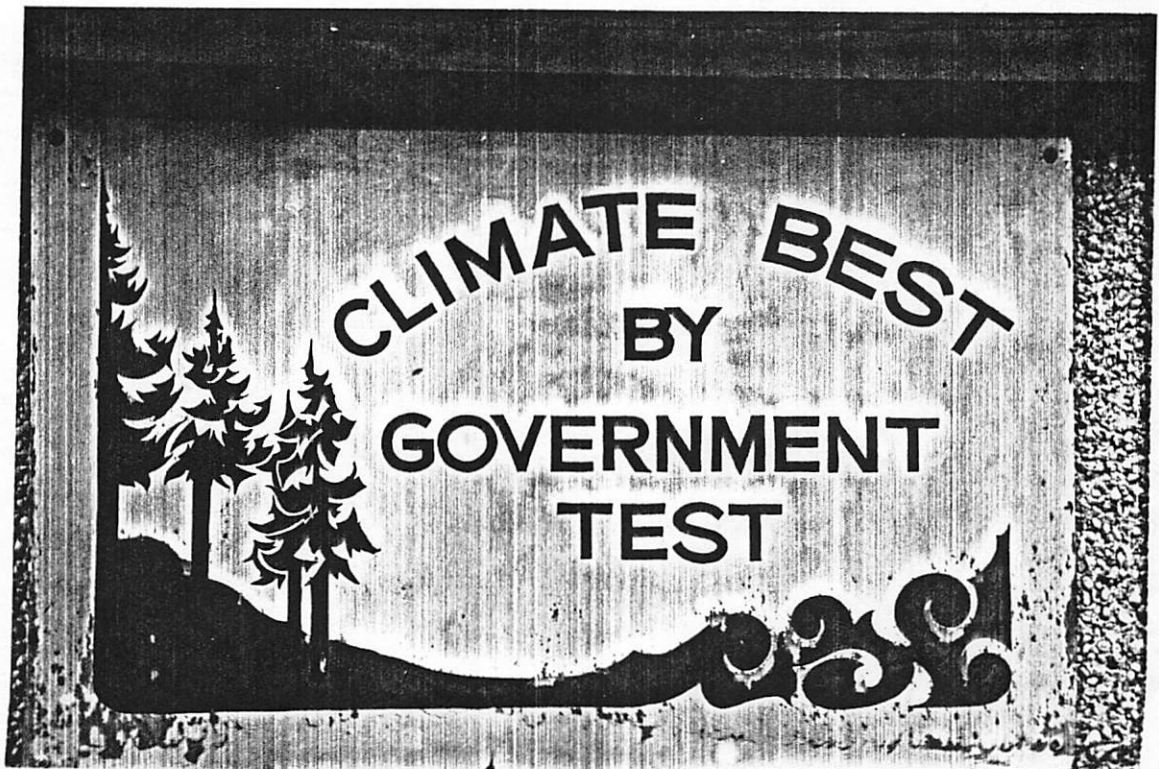
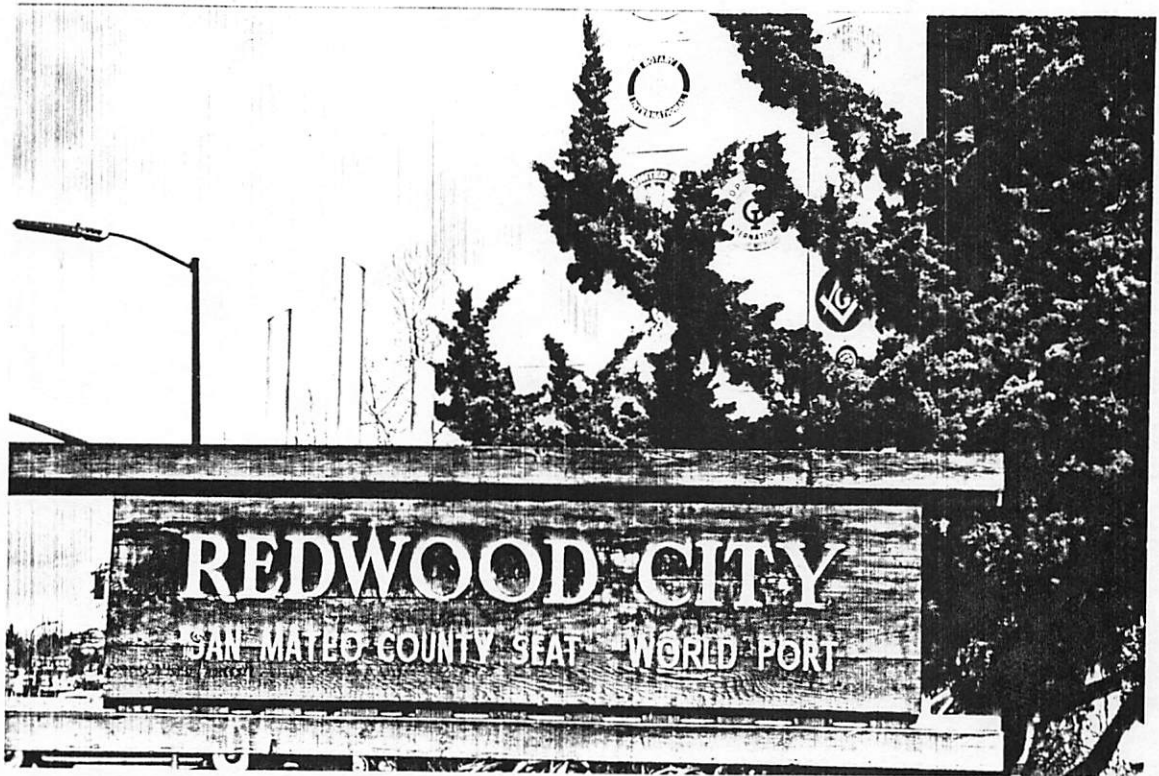

Redwood City submitted Paul Westin as a candidate for study abroad. In 1985-86, he went to New Zealand as a Foundation Scholar. Upon his return, he presented us with a speech of thanks at our August 19 meeting.

In addition to the \$ 1,500 spent by our club for the student exchange with our sister club in Hiratsuka, our members donated hundreds of dollars, which are not recorded. One member took the group to Disneyland, another took them to Lake Tahoe, another provided a party for the club and visitors while the host members paid the additional expense of an extra person in the home.

One of our members hosted a gala party for the visiting GSE team and about 30 Rotarians and 30 spouses. The cost of this affair was born by the Rotarian - value unknown!

One of our Rotarians hosted a District Governor from Nigeria. Another Rotarian hosted a family from St. Maartin, which they met in Las Vegas at the R.I. convention.

One of our Rotarians hosted a visiting Rotarian from Rovereto, Italy, which he met at the convention in Las Vegas.

10 BONUS Continued:

One of our Rotarians has conducted an exchange of Sequoia Gigantia (Redwood Trees) seeds throughout the world for several years. This program still continues and encourages International Communication.


Dear Rotarian William,

Last June when I was attending the Rotary International Conference in Las Vegas I joined the Rotary World Fellowship of Wine Appreciation.


I have the receipt for \$15.00 U.S. dated June 4th. 1986.
